THE WEEK AHEAD



Chinese New Year is also known as the Lunar New Year or Spring Festival, and each year it begins on the first day of the new moon.

The most important date in the Chinese calendar, it's believed that a good start to the year will lead to good luck. Traditionally, the day will begin with firecrackers and fireworks being set off, and the colour red is used everywhere.

The story goes that in ancient times, a monster named Nián would come up from the bottom of the sea once a year, to feast on animals and humans. On this day, the villagers would all escape into the mountains.

One year, an old man decided to face down the monster. He covered homes in red paper, dressed in red, and prepared firecrackers. When the Nián arrived, the red paper angered it, the firecrackers scared it, and when it saw the old man dressed in red, laughing at it - the Nián ran away!

The following morning, when villagers returned to their town, they found it had been saved from destruction. So, from then on, these colour and firecracker traditions continued.

While there are lots of ways to ensure good luck in the year ahead on Chinese New Year, there are also lots of things that you're supposed to avoid. One of these is taking a shower on the day of the New Year, as it could wash away any good luck you have with you. For the same reason, it's supposed to be important that you clean your home before the big day, to save you sweeping away good luck.

You probably know that the 12 animals in the Chinese zodiac are used to represent

years. In order, these are: Rat, Ox, Tiger, Rabbit, Dragon, Snake, Horse, Goat, Monkey, Rooster, Dog and Pig. Last year was the Year of the Pig, and this year, it's the rat's turn again.

The zodiac repeats every 12 years, making it easy to figure out whether it's your year. What's your zodiac animal?

If you were born in 2008, it's likely that your zodiac animal is a rat. While you might be thinking that your year will be lucky, it's actually said to be the opposite!

In Chinese culture, your zodiac year is seen as an obstacle to overcome. Some Chinese people believe that the best way to protect yourself from evil spirits and bad fortune in your zodiac year is to wear red underwear every day!



HOW TO SAY

Should you want to wish someone a happy Chinese New Year, there are various ways to do it in both Mandarin Chinese and in Cantonese - the main languages spoken in mainland China. For example, to wish someone success and riches in the new year, you can say 'gung hay fat choy' in Cantonese, or 'gong xi fa cai' (pronounced gong she fa tsai) in Mandarin.

Chinese New Year celebrations mark the defeat of Nián by an old man from the village.

Starting point

• The graphic of red underpants adds a humorous touch to the article. They look funny placed in the bottom corner of the page because you don't really associate pants with Chinese New Year, so they seem out of place. However, the image is appropriate because the underpants link to a Chinese superstition. Some Chinese people believe that the best way to protect yourself from evil spirits and bad fortune in your zodiac year is to wear red underwear every day.

Development

• Perhaps the image would have been even more effective if it had been against a different coloured background to make it stand out more.

C2. Look at the structure of the article. Do you think that the story behind Chinese New Year is appropriately placed within the text? Give reasons for your answer.

READING SKILL — Identify benefits of text organisation and presentation

Possible answer

Starting point

• In the main body text, there are two introductory paragraphs, then three paragraphs dedicated to the story and a final paragraph to end the article.

Development

• The story is appropriately placed because the introductory paragraphs are needed to give the background details about when Chinese New Year takes place and how it is celebrated. Then the story is told in order to explain why those colour and firecracker traditions came about. Finally, there is a paragraph developing the information on traditions to focus on how to avoid bad luck. The story is important because it provides the necessary context and ties the text together.
