She won top prize on the floor with a score of 13.966, ahead of Russia's Angelina Melnikova and Italy's Vanessa Ferrari. The Italian, aged 30, won her first senior European medal in 2006, 18 months after Gadirova was born!

Gadirova said: "To be on the top of the podium was just overwhelming. Just to even get selected for the European Championships, I was so happy and I was so proud to be here. Then to make the finals


week has gone along I've got more and more comfortable and confident."

Fellow Brits Joe Fraser, Amelie Morgan and Giarnni Regini-Moran all won bronze medals on the pommel, uneven bars and vault respectively.

Russia finished at the top of the overall medal table with 13, including five golds, ahead of Britain in second place, with a total of six medals. Russia's Nikita Nagornyy won all-around and floor gold, plus silver on pommel horse and rings, to help Russia come top of the men's table.

## FOOTBALL groups across England have united to make a stand against the ongoing abuse that many football players experience online.

A four-day social media boycott will take place from 3pm today (Friday 30 April) until Monday 3 May. Clubs across the Premier League, Women's Super League, English Football League and Women's Championship will switch off their Facebook, Twitter and Instagram accounts.

The boycott is part of a move to put pressure on social media companies to make more effort to combat online hate. Many players have been racially abused online in recent months, including Manchester United's Marcus

Rashford, Chelsea's Reece James, Arsenal forward Willian and Manchester City's Raheem Sterling.

The move has the support of several organisations, including Kick It Out, a charity tackling racism and discrimination in football.

Sanjay Bhandari, Kick It Out's chairman, said: "This boycott signifies our collective anger. Social media is now sadly a regular vessel for toxic abuse. By removing ourselves from the platforms, we are making a symbolic gesture to those with power. We need you to act. We need you to create change."

podium – A raised block on which people stand to receive a medal, give a speech, etc

social media – Websites that help people connect and share information with friends or groups, for example, Facebook, Instagram and Twitter

discrimination – Treating people worse than others because of the colour of their skin, their sex, their religion, etc

signifies – shows; to be a sign of something vessel – something that carries something else; in this case, people's messages platforms – Here, it means a set of online tools (provided by Facebook, Twitter etc) that allow people to create content, communicate and connect with others
