Now, recently, scientists revealed that this February has been the hottest February the world has ever seen since records began.

Yeah, globally it was on average 1.7 degrees warmer than pre-industrial levels in the 1700s before the widespread use of machines and technology. But what does climate change mean for our weather? Well, this week to mark World Meteorological Day, weather forecasts went out and TV channels all over the world showing what the weather may be like in the future if humans don't do more to control climate change.

From up there to down here, everything is crazy. If we don't listen to scientists, things are going to be even crazier when I grow up. They were part of the Weather Kids campaign by the United Nations Development Programme to highlight what climate change is doing to our planet. And the forecasts were put together with help from kids from all around the globe.

The UK's forecast was presented by nine-year-old Jack and created with help from the Met Office. Here's what he said the weather might be like us in 2050. Long heatwaves will affect 98% of children in the UK. All this heat could stop us from playing outside for ages, but don't worry, there's still a chance of clear skies.

We'll keep you posted as we track whether adults stop wasting time and seriously try to tackle the problem. Because it's not just a weather report to us. It's our future.

This week is Sign Language Week. It's held every year to raise awareness of British and Irish sign languages. British Sign Language, or BSL, has been recognised as a language by the UK government since 2003. Did you get to learn any BSL? So we learned a little bit in school. All I can remember is "Hello, how are you?" That's really cool.

But we didn't get to in any of my school. Well, one school in Suffolk has made some big changes to help the students that learn how to sign. They've swapped French and Spanish lessons for BSL.

British sign language is a way of communicating, using gestures, facial expression and body language. I love learning BSL because it's exactly like learning another language. Although I do like learning other languages and learning BSL is really important because you never know when you might need it. There are around 151,000 British sign language users in the UK. Just over half of them are considered deaf.

My favourite BSL word is 'family'. My favourite BSL word is 'turtle'. My favourite BSL word is 'dog'. One thing I like about BSL is you can talk behind the back while learning. I like the BSL because I get to use my hands and I fidget a lot, so that's good for me. I love the BSL choir because it's a fun way to connect with friends and to know of people much more than you did before.

I think obviously for the children who are deaf, having that communication with their hearing peers is a huge benefit. Just being able to feel more included, not feeling left out of conversations. But I think also for the hearing children, it's great for them because they're learning a new language, a new skill. Sometimes when I'm at school, I use BSL to talk to deaf people.

I've got a friend that is half deaf and sometimes I have to sign to her because she can't hear me that well. I think more schools should be teaching BSL even if you're not deaf, because I have a family member that is deaf like how I can communicate to them.
