

HOW TO ACCESS PRINTABLES



Your school has unlimited access to each week's resources and a full library of previous activities. Any number of teachers at your school can register to access them, and each will need to follow the instructions below:

REGISTERING FOR THE FIRST TIME

- 1 Visit schools.firstnews.co.uk/register
- 2 Enter your school's First News Education ID and click 'Confirm'
- 3 Enter your details in the form and click 'Complete'
- 4 Invite colleagues at your school who will also be using Printables
- 5 You will be automatically logged in once you have registered



COMPREHENSIONS

News reports are ideal for short, focused comprehension or discussion activities. Like authors, journalists play with language, so news 'stories' are rich nuggets of text to investigate. Engaging, thought-provoking stories from the newspaper are selected for the news comprehension activities, helping children unpack and understand the often complex ideas and events in a news story.



LEARNING UNDERTAKEN:

- Builds topical knowledge and understanding of the wider world outside the classroom: linking to other subjects across the curriculum.
- Enhances reading comprehension skills: developing vocabulary in context; identifying facts and opinions; explaining and summarising information; inferring ideas and finding evidence; identifying how language, structure and presentation contribute to meaning; identifying themes; understanding writer's intent.



LOWER KS2: News Qs

Three worksheets for LKS2 pupils, each featuring retrieval, inference, sequencing and prediction questions based on a story – or a pair of stories – from the latest issue of *First News*, with answer sheets and glossary definitions included. Differentiated three ways: tricky, trickier and trickiest! PDFs can be downloaded with or without answer sheets.



UPPER KS2: Reading Practice

Weekly worksheets for UKS2 pupils, based on an article – or pair of articles – from the latest issue of *First News*. Eight questions, designed to resemble the KS2 SATs reading booklet, plus an additional challenge to encourage longer answers and deeper engagement with the text. Glossary definitions and answer sheets linking to NC content domains included. PDFs can be downloaded with or without answer sheets.



KS3: Article Analysis

Weekly worksheets for students in KS3 (age 11+), as well as for those achieving greater depth in reading at UKS2. PDFs can be downloaded with or without answer sheets.

DEBATES

News is one of the greatest igniters of debate among children and adults alike. Being able to express one's voice and listen to those of others is an essential skill at every stage of our lives. LEVEL 1

LOWER KS2: News Puzzle

A simplified version of a story from the latest issue of *First News*. The crossword clues provide definitions of eight words in the news story, which pupils identify to complete the puzzle.



LEVEL 2

UPPER KS2: News Puzzle


Eight words or phrases from a news article are highlighted and defined to develop pupils' vocabulary and understanding of the story.

A challenging puzzle looking at the definitions of 10 words and specialist vocabulary in stories in the news.
