


MO Farah ran 5 km in just 13 minutes and 26.99 seconds, 15 seconds faster than the time he recorded when he won gold at the 2012 London Olympic Games!

MO FARAH has become only the second man in history to complete an Olympic and world double gold in the distance events after winning the 5 km at the World Championships.

The runner added the 5 km title to the 10 km gold he won six days earlier in Moscow to become only the second man, after Ethiopian Kenenisa Bekele, to win both long-distance crowns at the Olympics and the World Championships.

It's the fifth world or Olympic gold medal for the runner after he also won the 5 km and 10 km at last year's Olympic Games in London and 5 km at the World Championships in Daegu in 2011.

Speaking of his 5km win Mo revealed:"I never thought in my career I would achieve something like this. This was very tough - it was all left to the last two laps. I had a lot of pressure but at the same time I enjoy it."

days after winning her only Grand Slam title, Wimbledon champion Marion Bartoli announced her retirement. The 28 -year-old Frenchwoman, who is ranked seventh in the world, revealed that she will be retiring immediately because of injuries.

30minutes after crossing the finish line and thinking they'd won the bronze medal at the World Championships, the Great British $4 \times 100$ metres relay team were told they had been disqualified. The team lost out on a medal due to an illegal baton transfer which took place between Aryeetey and Ellington outside of the changeover box.

4gold medals each were won by British swimmers Stephanie Millward and Amy Marren at the IPC Swimming World Championships. Paralympic champion Ellie Simmonds also added to Team GB's wins by clinching gold in the S6 100m freestyle.
71 competing nations and territories will be visited by the newly-designed Queen's Baton ahead of the Commonweath Games in Glasgow next year. The Queen's Baton, which is similar to the Olympic torch, was designed by Glasgow-based 4c Design and contains the Queen's handwritten message to the Commonweath. The 288-day relay, covering 118,000 miles, will get under way on 9 October at Buckingham Palace.

6. Why do you think the journalist has described Mo Farah as winning the long-distance'crowns'?

L3 - identifying basic features with little or no comment

- He is like a king because he has won the races.

L5 - identifying features with some explanation/awareness of effect

- It turns Mo Farah into the sporting king of the race track because he has achieved such greatness in winning the double.
- In the Ancient Olympic Games, the winner would wear an olive wreath on their head - a crown of victory. So, the journalist is not only emphasising how Mo Farah is making history, but is also referencing part of a tradition of champions that goes back over a thousand years.

## 7. Why do you think the journalist has included a quote by Mo Farah at the end of the article?

L4 - simple comments identifying main purpose, little awareness of effect

- Readers will want to know how Mo Farah feels about his achievement.

L5 - clearly identifying and commenting on purpose and effect

- By quoting Mo Farah, the journalist brings the story closer to the reader to make it more real for us. We actually get to read what Mo Farah himself thought about what he experienced. That is first hand information, 'from the horse's mouth', instead of just a journalist's second hand description of an event.
- The journalist has chosen to end with a quote with emotive words, such describing how he was under "pressure" and how"tough" it was to win the double. This emphasises what an incredible achievement it was for Mo Farah to win the double gold, especially as he did not think he was even capable of it.

10. Which one of these articles, would be most suitable for the front page of First News and why?

AF6 - Identify and comment on writers' purposes and viewpoints and the overall effect of the text on the reader.
The obvious choice for the front page story is the article, Mo makes history.
Possible answers:
L4 - simple comments identifying main purpose, little awareness of effect

- It is a good, eye-catching photo.
- Mo Farah has won double gold, so it is a good story for the front page.
- You want to find out why Mo Farah has made history.

L5 - clearly identifying and commenting on purpose and effect

- A front page story needs to attract readers and make them want to buy the newspaper.

Mo Farah is the most famous and popular person on the page, so people would recognise his name in the headline and his image in the large photo and this would draw them to the newspaper to read a story about him.
-The article has the most eye-catching and memorable headline, especially with the use of alliteration:'Mo makes history'.

- The headline tells the story but is also mysterious because you don't know all the details, i.e. just why Mo has made history. This would suit the front page because it would be another clever way to make the reader buy the paper to find out why.
- It is the most newsworthy story in the SPORT section because only one other man in history has achieved the Olympic and world double gold in the distance events.
