LOOOOONGEST LEGS




An American teenager has a Guinness World Record for being the woman with the world's longest legs. Seventeenyear-old Maci Currin, from Texas, is 6ft 10in (2.08m) tall, while her legs measure more than 52in (1.34m) each. Maci thinks that people who have unusual physical qualities should "embrace it - don't hide it".

RARE BOOK SALE

A first edition book by Sir Isaac Newton has sold for £22,000. Isaac Newton is best known for describing the laws of motion and helping our understanding of how gravity works. He explains this in Mathematical Principles of Natural Philosophy, the book that sold at auction. The copy of the book was almost 300 years old!

Cursed Canadian

A Canadian tourist has sent back artefacts that she stole from the ancient city of Pompeii in 2005. She sent them to an Italian travel agent, along with a letter claiming that the relics were "cursed" and had brought years of bad luck. Pompeii was destroyed in the year AD79, by the eruption of Mount Vesuvius. The tourist said that the artefacts had "so much negative energy linked to that land of destruction" and begged for them to be taken back by the city

Along with the opportunity to find fascinating facts and appreciate the opinions of those involved, there is plenty to be inferred and deduced to understand in more depth what is being reported. Like authors, journalists play with language, so news 'stories' are rich nuggets of text to investigate and provide the opportunity for literacy programmes.

TEACHER ANSWER GUIDE: The teacher answers are intended to provide a quick reference guide. Suggestions are given for the 'Expected response' or starting point that pupils could give. The 'Development' then gives more in-depth ideas that students can work towards as they develop their reading comprehension skills.



Development

- Lots of engineers will have been involved in improving the ISS toilet design to make specific improvements, such as working better for women and making it a better pooing position to avoid accidents. Project manager, Melissa McKinley, tells us that accidents are a big deal to clear up on the ISS.
- The project team will have wanted to perfect the design by trying and testing it before they sent the actual new toilet to be fitted in the ISS, which will be an expensive process.


Starting point

• Burmese pythons are not a native species in Florida. They must have been introduced to the area at some point in the past. The pythons are doing very well in the wild, so people are paid to catch them and remove them so they don't cause problems for the local, native wildlife.
